I'm so glad you're here. In this little mini class, we're making a sweet 3D Christmas tree that sits on top of a pull-out drawer box. It's adorable, simple, and such a fun way to package a small treat, a heartfelt note, or one of the little "treasures" you'll find later in this guide.

I first shared this drawer-box design years ago, and it remains one of my all-time favourites - especially when paired with these cute little 3D trees. Putting the two together creates a charming keepsake you can gift to anyone on your list.

To make this project even more special, I've included some lovely extras you can tuck inside your drawer: a whole list of gift ideas, my recipe for Buttertart Squares (this is one of my favourite treats), and a cute Left-Right Christmas Gift Exchange Game you can roll up or fold inside for a fun holiday surprise.

3D Christmas Tree Gift Box Tutorial

MEASUREMENTS

CARD BASE

- Cardstock: 3" × 12"
- Score on the 12" side at:
- 3", 4", 7", 8", and 11"

TRFAT DRAWFR

- Cardstock: 4%" × 4%"
- Score at 1" on all four sides

INSIDE PANEL

 Cardstock or patterned paper: 2³/₄" × 2³/₄"



INSTRUCTIONS

Create the card base

- 1. Score the 3" × 12" cardstock at 3", 4", 7", 8", and 11".
- 2. Fold along all score lines and burnish well with a bone folder.
- 3. This forms a card that opens to reveal a centre section for the treat drawer.

Make the treat drawer

- 4. Score the 4%" × 4%" cardstock at 1" on all four sides.
- 5. Cut up the score lines on each corner.
- 6. Add adhesive to the tabs and fold up to create a shallow box.

Add the drawer front

- 7. Create a layered embellishment (circles, labels, or die cuts).
- 8. Adhere it to the front of the drawer.

Create the drawer handle

- 9. Punch a hole in the centre of the drawer front.
- 10. Thread ribbon or twine through the hole and tie a knot on the outside.
- 11. Secure the ribbon inside the drawer with a glue dot.

Decorate as desired & fill the drawer with treats.

3D Christmas Tree Ornament



INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Die-cut or punch five (or more) trees using a tree punch or coordinating dies.
- 2. Stamp the trees or run them through an embossing folder for added texture, if desired.
- 3. Fold each tree in half lengthwise, lining up the edges carefully.
- 4. Glue the folded trees together, stacking them one on top of the other and aligning the folds.
- 5. Fan the tree open and glue the two end pieces together to form the 3D tree shape.
- 6. Punch or die-cut two small stars from gold cardstock. Glue them together and attach them to the top of the tree. Add a gem for a finishing touch.

Note:

If you'd like to add ribbon or twine to hang the tree as an ornament, glue the ribbon loop inside the tree before adhering the final two ends together.

3D Christmas Tree Spinner Base



INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Die-cut or punch two circles:
 - o one larger circle from cardstock
 - o one smaller circle from a foam sheet
- 2. Cut patterned paper to $2\frac{3}{4}$ " × $2\frac{3}{4}$ " and place it on a piercing mat.
- 3. Layer the pieces:
 - o place the cardstock circle centred on the patterned paper
 - o centre the foam circle on top
- 4. Using a Take Your Pick tool, pierce through the centre of all three layers.
- 5. Insert a brad through the holes to secure the patterned paper, foam circle, and cardstock circle together.
- 6. Add foam adhesive strips to the back of the patterned paper and adhere the spinner to the top of the box.
- 7. Attach the tree:
 - o add a generous amount of hot glue to the centre of the spinner
 - o place the tree on top and hold briefly until secure
- 8. Add more hot glue around the base of the tree and sprinkle with glitter to create a decorative tree base.

Note: You can also use any of the alternate base ideas shown in the video.

6. Stir & Enjoy

- Single tea sachets are like a hug in a mug!
- Mix up a batch of Winter Spiced Tea Mix or my cozy Camp Coffee, portion it into small cello bags, and tuck one inside the treat box.
- For a special finishing touch, include the printed recipe, add a mini candy cane, or tie a little vintage teaspoon to the box for an extra bit of charm.

7. Keepsakes

- Jewellery
- Key charm
- Photo strip
- Small pressed flower
- Tiny shell or stone

8. A Small Note / Letter / Gratitude Slip A folded message of love or encouragement:

- "Open when you need a smile"
- "You are loved"
- "Thinking of you this Christmas"

9. A Pocket Prayer or Blessing

- "May peace fill your home this season"
- "Blessings for a joyful Christmas"

10. A Mini DIY Craft Kit

- · die-cut pieces to make a matching tag
- punched shapes
- a little string/twine bundle
- embellishments (gems, buttons, etc)





A Year of Gratitude

This treat box can also be used as a meaningful keepsake for the year ahead. Invite the recipient to write down good things that happen throughout the year — big or small — on little slips of paper and tuck them into the drawer as the months go by. Moments of joy, answered prayers, small wins, and everyday blessings all count.

At the end of the year, they can open the box and read through the memories — a gentle reminder of just how much goodness the year held.

This idea works beautifully as a New Year gift, an encouragement gift, or a thoughtful keepsake for someone who could use a little extra hope.

Title ideas:

- A Year of Gratitude
- Moments Worth Remembering
- Little Notes of Joy

One-line instruction card:

Write down moments of gratitude, joy, or answered prayers throughout the year and tuck them into the box. Open at the end of the year and read them all again.



Left-Right Christmas Gift Exchange Game

The Left-Right Christmas Gift Exchange Game





- 1. Everyone sits in a circle holding a wrapped gift.
- 2. Read the story aloud slowly.
- 3. Every time you hear the word "LEFT," pass your gift to the left.
- 4. Every time you hear the word "RIGHT," pass your gift to the right.
- 5. When the story ends the gift you're holding is yours!

From My Kitchen to Yours:



Buttertart Squares Recipe

These. Are. Sinful. I once made a pan of these for friends and was promptly told to never make them again - because once you eat one, you're done for. You simply have to go back for another! The buttery shortbread crust paired with that rich, caramel-y raisin filling is pure heaven. This recipe makes a generous batch and the squares freeze beautifully. Enjoy... I know you will!

Recipe Variation: If you want to, add 3/4 cup chopped walnuts to the caramel mixture.

Ingredients:

Crumb Base

- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup butter
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar

Topping

- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 4 eggs
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- · Pinch of salt
- 11/2 cups raisins
- (Optional: 3/4 cup chopped nuts)

Note: If you're not a fan of raisons, this recipe is also delicious if you omit them.

Directions:

Make the Crumb Base:

- 1. Combine flour and sugar.
- 2. Cut in the butter until the mixture is crumbly.
- 3. Press evenly into a 10" x 15" cookie sheet.
- 4. Bake at 350°F for 15 minutes.

Prepare the Topping:

- 1.In a bowl, combine the softened butter and brown sugar; mix well.
- 2.Add the eggs and mix thoroughly.
- 3.In a separate bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, salt, and vanilla.
- 4.Add this mixture to the wet ingredients.
- 5. Stir in the raisins (and nuts, if using).
- 6. Spread the topping evenly over the baked base.

Bake:

- 1. Return the pan to the oven and bake at 350°F for 20–25 minutes.
- 2.Let cool completely.
- 3. Cut into squares, make a cup of tea & enjoy!

Carrys Coffee Mix

This cosy Camp Coffee mix is perfect for packaging up and tucking inside your treat box. Warm, comforting, and easy to make ahead, it's a lovely little gift for chilly days or quiet moments at home. So good. Enjoy!



INGREDIENTS

- 2 CUPS POWDERED NON-DAIRY COFFEE CREAMER
- 1 ½ CUPS INSTANT HOT CHOCOLATE MIX
- 1 ½ CUPS INSTANT COFFEE GRANULES
- 1 ½ CUPS WHITE SUGAR
- 1 TEASPOON GROUND CINNAMON
- ½ TEASPOON GROUND NUTMEG

DIRECTIONS

- 1. In a large bowl, stir together the coffee creamer, hot chocolate mix, instant coffee, sugar, nutmeg and cinnamon.
- 2. Store in an airtight container at room temperature.

TO SERVE:

• To make 1 cup, spoon 2 heaping tablespoons of the mix into a coffee mug, and add 1 cup of boiling water. Stir until dissolved.

Note: This is the tea blend I originally tucked into the treat box. I purchased the instant tea powder while visiting the UK and have never been able to find the same product here in Canada.

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Spiced Winter Tea Mix

"Also known as Friendship Tea, I loved making this to tuck inside the treat box and to serve at my classes and events. It was always a hit and a much-requested recipe. Enjoy!"



INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 CUP INSTANT TEA POWDER
- 1 CUP SWEETENED LEMONADE POWDER
- 1 CUP ORANGE-FLAVOURED DRINK MIX (SUCH AS TANG)
- 1 TEASPOON GROUND CINNAMON
- ½ TEASPOON GROUND CLOVES

DIRECTIONS

- 1. In a large bowl, combine the instant tea powder, lemonade powder, orange drink mix, cinnamon, and cloves.
- 2. Mix well and store in an airtight container.

TO SERVE:

- Add 2-3 teaspoons of the mix to a mug.
- Pour in 1 cup of boiling water, stir well, and adjust to taste.

Note: This is the tea blend I originally tucked into the treat box. I purchased the instant tea powder while visiting the UK and have never been able to find the same product here in Canada.
